It's still ticket-selling time, so all the coaches ooze optimism. Brotherhood of the league is a frequent theme, even though Michigan's Bo Schembechler once again did his annual vanishing act before Mike White of Illinois got up to speak.

# Iowa Amateur golf tourney begins today

WATERLOO, IA. — Another top-notch field gathers for the 83rd annual Iowa Amateur golf championship today, with a wide-open race for the title expected.

About the only sure thing is that Chris Donielson of West Des Moines won't defend his title. Donielson, who won last year's championship at the Cedar Rapids Country Club with a 5-hole total of 2-over-par 215, has turned professional.

A talent-laden field of 176 golfers will be out to end Donielson's one-year reign over the par-72, 6,850-yard Sunnyside Country Club course that will present plenty of challenges.

Out-of-bounds comes into play on the holes, with water lurking on six others. The premium will be on placement and accuracy as well as distance.

Three players who have won major point events this year — Mike Ketcham of Ottumwa, Terry Prusha of Fort Dodge and Greg Tebbutt of Bettendorf — are entered here.

Ketcham, who will play golf at the University of Arkansas this fall, won the amateur division of last week's Waterloo Open. He also finished second in the Riverboat Days Amateur in Clinton and tied for fifth in the Fort Dodge Amateur. He placed fourth in last year's Iowa Amateur.

Prusha captured the Fort Dodge Amateur, the first local resident to do so since 1962, and was fifth in last year's Iowa Amateur.

Tebbutt, who captured Amateur of the Year honors last season after winning four major tournaments, won the year's Ottumwa Amateur. He also won the 1982 Iowa Amateur at Fribine in Iowa City and tied for sixth in 1981.

Another player at the top of the game is Dana Kain of Ames. Runner-up in the amateur of the year point standings the past two seasons, Kain is fresh off a strong showing in the National Public Links tournament in Hawaii.

He qualified for match play, then won his first two matches before failing to reach the quarterfinals.

In addition to Tebbutt, four other former champions spruce up the field. Six-time champion John Jacobs of Cedar Rapids, three-time winner Larry Leahy of Cedar Falls, 1936 winner Bill Hall of Monticello and 1983 winner Max Simpson of Ottumwa.

Tee times run from 8 a.m. to 2:40 p.m. both today and Saturday, with the field whittled down to the 90 scores and ties for Sunday's final 18-hole round.
